Public Works Director, Russ Robertson stated that the purpose of this item was to allow City Manager to execute an agreement with Michael Balliet Consulting to evaluate SB 1383 compliance, as this new law required the separation and collection of organic waste for all residential customers beginning January 1, 2022. This bill required residents to separate food waste and place them in the green can with the yard clippings. He added that Michael Balliet Consulting specialized in compliance with the state mandates and would provide a report to the City of Reedley to review the current process and provide an outside view to see if the City of Reedley was collecting solid waste in the most cost-effective way.

Sarah Reid, Community Services Director said that it is rare to receive funding without requiring matching funds which would also give them the flexibility to consider the needs of the community. On June, 2018, California voters had passed Proposition 68 which was also known as the Parks, Environment, and Water Bond Act and this non-competitive grant program provided funding to local government to support rehabilitation, creation and improvement

of local parks. The City of Reedley had qualified for both the General Per Capita Program and the Urban County Per Capita for the total amount of \$194,081 and said that with this limited amount the Community Services Commission was recommending the best projects. The first project was at Trimble Park, and that with the donation made by the Melville Family in the amount of \$100,000, the shade structure had been completed with a remaining amount of the donation of \$45,516.48. She said that the donor had asked if it could assist with completion of the playground structure that was proposed at Trimble Park but had not been added at the original time of construction. After evaluating possibilities, they agreed upon the climbing structure displayed on her presentation. Ms. Reid said that staff was recommending that a little over \$10,000 be used from the Per Capita Fund in order to make this project whole and that the city would need to partner with the Foundation again like they had with the shade structure and that this would complete the projects at Trimble Park. The second project park was identified at Citizens Park. Ms. Reid said that the park had been constructed in 2006 and the life span of the shade sails were 10-15 years. The shade sails were starting to tear and showing wear and would eventually rip. This park was one of the heaviest used parks in Reedley and with the hot summers in the valley the shade allowed for year round use. Staff had received two bids to replace the shade sails and were confident the price would not exceed \$36,000. The third project was the playground rubber surface a Citizens Park which was the same age as the shade sails and like the rubber surface walking trail that had been removed, it too was getting to the point that repairs would not be possible and would get to be a safety concern. She asked that Council approve the project list, approve and authorized City Manager to sign an application for each project and lastly adopt the resolution approving the terms and designate the City Manager as the authorize representative.

Steve Penner, Community Services Commissioner spoke in support of the projects proposed.

WORKSHOP

11. WORKSHOP REGARDING THE ACTUARIAL VALUATION REPORT OF THE REEDLEY RETIREE HEALTHCARE PLAN.

Assistant City Manager, Paul Melikian provided a power point presentation also available on the city's website. Mr. Melikian provided a brief overview on the annual valuation of the City of Reedley Retiree Healthcare Plan as of June 30, 2019 which was completed by Bartel Associates, LLC. He said that the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 75 required that an actuarial valuation of the total OPEB liability be required and performed at least every two years and the information be included in the City's financial statements and that the city was simply complying with this requirement. His presentation provided history of the plan, cost mitigation measures, and current status.

12. UPDATE ON THE 2020 CENSUS PROCESS. - Community Development

Rob Terry, Community Development Director provided a brief update on the 2020 Census process. He stated that originally the U.S. Census Staff was scheduled to be available at the Reedley Community Center on the first Monday of each month throughout the spring of 2020, however those efforts were derailed by COVID-19. Despite the impacts as of August 15, 2020, 67.1% of the housing units in Fresno County had self-reported with 72.7% of that number responding utilizing the online response system. He said that Reedley specifically had 69.5% of housing units responding also utilizing the online system. Mr. Terry said that up to date information was always available at the www.2020census.gov site which also included instructions and access for responding online, via phone, or via mail; plus frequently asked questions.





RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution No. 2020-091 of the City Council of the City of Reedley authorizing the submission of one grant application for the 2020 Active Transportation Program (ATP) from the California Department of Transportation through the competitive regional bid and authorize the execution of application related documents by the City Engineer.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On September 26, 2013, Governor Brown signed legislation creating the ATP in the Department of Transportation (Senate Bill 99, Chapter 359 and Assembly Bill 101, Chapter 354). The ATP consolidates existing federal and state transportation programs, including the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP), Bicycle Transportation Account (BTA), and State Safe Routes to School (SRTS), into a single program with a focus to make California a national leader in active transportation.

The purpose of the ATP is to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation by achieving the following goals:

- Increase the proportion of trips accomplished by biking and walking
- Increase safety and mobility for non-motorized users
- Advance the active transportation efforts of regional agencies to achieve Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals, pursuant to SB 375 (of 2008) and SB 341 (of 2009)
- Enhance public health
- Ensure that disadvantaged communities fully share in the benefits of the program
- Provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation users

As part of the ATP there is a percentage of funding allocated to each regional transportation authority, including Fresno Council of Governments (FCOG), where participating agencies may apply for regional funding for projects through a competitive grant process. FCOG requires that all agencies submitting applications provide a resolution that expresses the City's commitment to and support of the project. The resolution confirms the City's approval of the project and dedication to deliver the project as programmed.

The project the City will submit for consideration is the Jefferson and Monte Vista Safe Routes to School (Project). The Project includes the installation of sidewalk and curb ramps on Jefferson Avenue, Washington Avenue, Lincoln Avenue, Sunset Avenue and Columbia Avenue as shown on the attached project location map. Some right of way will need to be acquired at the intersections as part of the Project for the curb ramps.

The ATP Cycle 5 grant applications are due by November 20, 2020 to FCOG for regional consideration. The projects are anticipated to be scored on February 24, 2021, approved by the TTC/PAC on March 12, 2021 and approved by the FCOG Policy Board on March 25, 2021. These dates are subject to change, however, it is anticipated that the City will know by Spring of 2021 if the Project was selected.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact to the City to prepare and submit this funding application.





RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council of the City of Reedley open the Public Hearing pursuant to Proposition 218 and adopt Resolution 2020-093 adjusting sewer service rates per the attached "Exhibit A", beginning December 1, 2020.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On January 14, 2020, the City Council approved an agreement with HDR Engineering to perform a comprehensive sewer rate study (Study) per State law to provide a full detailed analysis of the Sewer Enterprise fund and determine if rate changes are necessary for the fund to remain solvent.

The Final Draft Study was completed and an in-depth review of the Study was presented at the August 25, 2020 City Council meeting. After the presentation, Council adopted Resolution 2020-072 providing direction to staff and setting the date for a Public Hearing for October 27, 2020, to allow the public to comment and to consider any objections or protests to the proposed sewer rate increases and adjustments.

The California Constitution, as amended by Proposition 218 in 1996, requires that before utility rates or fees are increased, a City must provide notice of the proposed increased fees, hold a public hearing on the proposed increased fees, and consider protests against the proposed increased fees. Notice must be sent at least 45 days prior to the public hearing, and the increased fees can be approved at the public hearing and thereafter imposed unless written protests are submitted by a majority of the property owners.

Staff noticed residents, pursuant to Proposition 218, regarding the proposed rate increases and public hearing via city wide mass mailing sent out on September 2, 2020. A copy of the Proposition 218 notice to residents is attached to this staff report.

The Study was posted on the City of Reedley website and hard copies were made available at City Hall for the public's review. The Study concluded that only inflationary increases to sewer

rates will be required to offset increasing costs in materials, supplies, labor, and infrastructure improvements. Fortunately, the recommended rate increase is nominal, and simply keeps pace with inflation. If approved, the City is hopeful that future large increases to rates can be avoided.

At the time that this staff report was written, the City has not received any letters of protest to the proposed solid waste rate increases.

BACKGROUND

In 2006, the City was experiencing rapid growth due to the housing boom and the Waste Water Treatment Plant was nearing capacity. The Council was faced with a decision to either expand the Waste Water Treatment Plant to handle additional City growth or start denying new development applications due to inability to provide sewer treatment services. Council made the decision to expand the treatment plant to a state-of-the-art facility nearly doubling its capacity to accommodate growth and future development. In 2007, the City took out approximately \$31.1 million in debt for the expansion project through the combination of a 20 year loan from the California State Water Resources Control Board through the State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan program and a 30 year Wastewater Utility Revenue Bond. Unfortunately, not long after the project was completed the housing market crashed and new development stopped. Sewer rates had to be increased over 50% after the project was completed in order to pay for the annual debt service. This debt pushed Reedley's monthly sewer rates higher than neighboring cities.

Currently, development is on the rise in Reedley, and as our neighboring cities are struggling with outdated waste water treatment plants that are near capacity the City of Reedley is poised and prepared to accommodate new development and growth well into the future. Additionally, as more homes and businesses pay for sewer services and contribute toward the City's bond debt this will take pressure off of sewer service rates.

Throughout the years the Council has been prudent that rates are not increased unless absolutely necessary. This is evidenced by the sewer rate history of the last 5 years.

2015 No increase

2016 No increase

2017 Inflationary increase (2.4%)

2018 Inflationary increase (2.5%)

2019 No increase

Besides bond debt obligations, the City is also tasked with maintaining and replacing sewer main infrastructure, some of which is approaching 100 years old. There are several capital projects planned for the next two years including replacement of the City's critical sewer main pipeline that crosses the Olson Ave. Bridge and goes through Cricket Hollow Park and into the waste water treatment plant. This 2.4 million dollar project is critical as pipe of the same age on Reed Ave. and Olson collapsed in December of 2015 cutting off sewer flow for 95% of the City. The costs of these major infrastructure projects continues to increase every year.

WHEREAS, notice of the proposed sewer rate increases and adjustments was mailed to each parcel in accordance with the requirements of Proposition 218 and Government Code section 53750 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing to consider the proposed sewer rates and any protests to such rates was held at a public meeting on October 27, 2020, before the City Council of the City of Reedley, which meeting and hearing was more than 45 days after the notice to each parcel was mailed; and

WHEREAS, written protests to the proposed sewer rates were not presented by a majority of the owners of the identified parcels in the City of Reedley; and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it in the public interest to adjust the sewer rates and charges as set forth in attached Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, the proposed sewer rates set forth in Exhibit "A" are required to cover the cost of providing sewer collection and treatment services to the users thereof and the rates and charges set forth herein are non- discriminatory and do not exceed the cost of providing sewer services for which the rates and charges are imposed; and

7/1/2021 (and future years)

Rate increases in future years shall be effective each July 1, beginning July 1, 2021, and shall be based on the inflationary index, not to exceed 2.5% or less than 0.0%

CITY OF REEDLEY NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING REGARDING PROPOSED INCREASE CHANGE IN SEWER RATES

To comply with Proposition 218 (California Constitution Article XIIID, Section 6), the City of Reedley gives the following notice:

1. Date, Time, Location and Purpose of Public Hearing:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT at 7:00 p.m. on October 27, 2020, at the City of Reedley City Council Chambers located at 845 G Street, Reedley, CA 93654, the Reedley City Council will hold a public hearing regarding the proposed increase in the City's sewer rates and to hear and consider objections and protests to the proposed increase.

2. Location of Report:

A report has been prepared and submitted by an independent engineering firm evaluating the status of the City's sewer enterprise fund, and the necessity for additional revenue to cover current debt obligations (the "Report"). This information was presented and discussed during a public workshop at the City Council meeting held on August 25, 2020. The Report and supplemental presentations are on file with the Public Works Department, Reedley City Hall, 1733 Ninth Street, Reedley, CA. A copy of the Report and supplemental presentations can be reviewed or obtained upon request.

3. Proposed Sewer Rates:

The current sewer rates as well as the proposed schedule of sewer rate increases are attached as **Exhibit A** to this notice. Sewer rates are proposed to be adjusted effective December 1, 2020. The City will also consider approving an annual inflationary adjustment for future rate increases beginning July 1, 2021, and to be considered each July 1st thereafter. The annual inflationary adjustment, will be tied to a 10 year running average of the Department of Labor consumer price index (CPI). The CPI adjustment will be no less than 0.0% and no greater than 2.5%. For instance, if the CPI is 2% then the way to determine your new rate will be to multiply the existing rate by 1.02 to get the new rate. This annual inflationary adjustment is designed to reflect inflationary impacts on City operating and capital costs over the projected rate study period and help alleviate the need for large rate increases in the future.

Reason for the change in sewer rates:

The City is responsible for the collection, treatment, and disposal of Reedley's waste water (sewer). The sewer enterprise fund continues to face inflationary increases in operational costs for materials, supplies, and labor. In addition to operational expenses, there are ongoing capital improvement project costs which include repairs, replacement facilities and equipment to improve the safety, efficiency, and reliability of the sewer system. These include projects required to meet State regulatory treatment mandates. Today's strict State and federal standards means higher costs to filter, disinfect, and test waste water before it returns it to the environment. Sewer rates must be increased as proposed in the attached schedule (Exhibit A) in order to generate the revenue sufficient for the sewer enterprise fund to remain solvent. The proposed increased sewer rates do not exceed the proportional existing and future cost of providing sewer service to you.

- 5. **Basis Upon Which Amount of Proposed Change in Sewer Rates Was Calculated:** The basis on which the proposed increased sewer rates are established can be found in the Report on file at the Public Works Office.
- Procedure for Hearing and Protesting Proposed Rate Increase: You have the right to submit a written protest against the proposed increase in sewer rates either by mailing or delivering the written protest to the City Clerk at 1717 Ninth Street, Reedley, CA 93654, or delivering the written protest at the public hearing. You have the right to withdraw a written protest that you previously submitted prior to the conclusion of the public hearing. At the time stated for the public hearing in paragraph 1 of this Notice, the Council will hear and consider all objections and written protests, if any, to the proposed sewer rates. The Council may continue the hearing from time to time. At the close of the hearing, Council will count all written protests timely submitted. Council will not count written protests submitted after the conclusion of the public hearing. Only one protest per parcel will be counted. A written protest must include (1) your name and original signature; (2) identification of the parcel by parcel number or address; (3) whether you are the owner of the parcel or the person receiving the service for which the rate is charged; and (4) your statement that you protest the increase in the sewer rates. Written protests will not be accepted by e-mail or fax. Verbal protests will not be counted. If written protests against the proposed increased sewer rates are presented and not withdrawn by a majority of the record owners of the parcels that would be subject to the sewer rates, the City may not impose the proposed sewer rates; instead, sewer rates would continue at the previously approved amounts. If, at the close of the public hearing, there is no majority protest as described above, the Council may approve the proposed sewer rates, or some lesser increase to the sewer rates, to be effective commencing December 1, 2020.

RECOMMENDATION

In procedural order

- 1. That the City Council hold a public hearing for the Annexation of Territory (Annexation No. 18) to Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 (Public Services).
- 2. Consider approval of Resolution No. 2020-087, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Reedley of annexation of territory to the City of Reedley Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 (Public Services), authorizing the levy of a special tax, and submitting the question of levying a special tax within the area proposed to be annexed to qualified electors for Annexation Number 18.
- 3. Call for Special Election and have the City Clerk open the ballot(s) and announce the vote(s).
- 4. Consider approval of Resolution No. 2020-088, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Reedley declaring results of special annexation election, determining validity of prior proceedings, and directing recording of amendment to notice of special tax lien.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A condition to annex into the Community Facilities District (CFD) was imposed on new developments being processed by the City in November of 2005, when the District was established. Since that time, all properties must petition to be annexed to the existing CFD when development is proposed.

To initiate the process for annexation of territory to the CFD, the City Council approved a Resolution of Intention (Annexation No. 18) on September 22, 2020. The Resolution of Intention set a public hearing for October 27, 2020. The actions by the Council on October 27, 2020 finalize the annexation of territory to the CFD.

BACKGROUND

Since the requirement to annex into the CFD was imposed on all new development, development processed after November 2005 must be annexed into the existing CFD. Several property owners have submitted petitions to annex into the CFD as provided by the conditions of development of their property.

To initiate the process for annexation of territory to a CFD, the City Council approved a Resolution of Intention for Annexation No. 18 on September 22, 2020. The Resolution of Intention set a public hearing for October 27, 2020. The Rate and Method of Apportionment (RMA) referred to in the ROI is the same as adopted by the City Council with the Resolution of Formation in 2005. The RMA provides, amount other things, definitions, identifies what properties will be taxed, and the maximum special tax.

The purpose of the public hearing is to take public comment on the annexation of territory to the CFD and to accept protests from any property owner within the proposed boundaries. If no property protests are received, the Council may take the initial action to annex the territory to the CFD by approving a resolution on the annexation to the CFD and approving calling a special property owner election. Once the election is called, the City Clerk opens and tabulates the ballots. If two-thirds (2/3) of the returned ballots consent to the annexation, then the City Council can take action to direct the recording of the Notice of Special Tax Lien.

FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, the additional development to be annexed into the CFD will be placed on an upcoming tax roll.

PRIOR COUNCIL ACTIONS

On November 5, 2005 the City Council adopted the Resolution of Formation of the Community Facility District. Seventeen property annexations have been completed since formation of the CFD. On September 22, 2020, the City Council initiated the annexation of territory (Annexation No. 18).

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REEDLEY OF ANNEXATION OF TERRITORY TO THE CITY OF REEDLEY COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2005-1 (PUBLIC SERVICES), AUTHORIZING THE LEVY OF A SPECIAL TAX, AND SUBMITTING THE QUESTION OF LEVYING A SPECIAL TAX WITHIN THE AREA PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS – ANNEXATION NO. 18

RESOLVED, by the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Reedley (the "City"), as follows:

WHEREAS, this Council on September 22, 2020 adopted its Resolution No. 2020-077 (the "Resolution of Intention") stating its intention to annex certain territory identified as Annexation No. 18 to the City of Reedley Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 (Public Services) (the "District"), pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, a copy of the Resolution of Intention, incorporating a description and map of the proposed boundaries of the territory to be annexed to the District and stating the services to be funded by the District and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to pay for the services is on file with the City Clerk and the provisions thereof are fully incorporated herein by this reference as if fully set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, on the date hereof, this Council held a public hearing as required by the Act and the Resolution of Intention relative to the proposed annexation of territory to the District; and

WHEREAS, at the hearing all interested persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the annexation of territory to the District and the levy of special taxes within the area proposed to be annexed were heard and a full and fair hearing was held; and

WHEREAS, prior to the closing of the hearing, written protests were not made against the proposed annexation of territory to the District by (i) 50% or more of the registered voters residing in the existing District, or (ii) 50% or more of the registered voters residing in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District, or (iii) owners of one-half or more of the area of land in the existing District, or (iv) owners of one-half or more of the area of land in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District, and written or oral protests were not made by interested persons in sufficient number to preclude further proceedings to annex the territory proposed; and

WHEREAS, Annexation Map No. 18 to the District shows the territory to be annexed in these proceedings, and a copy of the map is on file with the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the City Council of the City of Reedley as follows:

Section 1. All prior proceedings taken by this Council with respect to the District and the proposed Annexation No. 12 have been duly considered and are hereby determined to be valid and in conformity with the Act, and the District has been validly established pursuant to the Act.

Section 2. The boundaries of the territory to be annexed to the District, as described in Annexation Map No. 12 to the District on file with the City Clerk and which Map shall be filed with and duly recorded by the County Recorder of the County of Fresno following approval of this Resolution, are hereby finally approved, are incorporated herein by this reference, and shall be included within the boundaries of the District, and said territory is hereby ordered annexed to the District, subject to voter approval of the levy of the special taxes therein as hereinafter provided.

Section 3. The provisions of the Resolution of Intention as adopted by this Council on September 22, 2020 are by this reference incorporated herein as if fully set forth herein.

Section 4. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the proposition of the levy of the special tax within the territory to be annexed to the District shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the area proposed to be annexed to the District at an election called therefore as hereinafter provided.

Section 5. This Council hereby finds that fewer than 12 persons have been registered to vote within the territory proposed to be annexed to the District for each of the 90 days preceding the close of the public hearing heretofore conducted and concluded by this Council for the purposes of these annexation proceedings. Accordingly, and pursuant to Section 53326 of the Act, this Council finds that the qualified electors for purposes of the annexation election are the landowners within the territory proposed to be annexed to the District and that the vote shall be by said landowners, each having one vote for each acre or portion thereof such landowner owns in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District.

Section 6. Pursuant to the Act, the election shall be conducted by mail ballot under Section 4000 of the California Elections Code.

Section 7. This Council acknowledges that the City Clerk has caused ballots in the forms set forth in **Exhibit "A"** attached hereto to be delivered to the sole qualified electors (landowners) of the territory proposed to be annexed. Each ballot indicated the number of votes to be voted by the landowner.

Each ballot was accompanied by all supplies and written instructions necessary for the use and return of the ballot. The envelope to be used to return the ballot was enclosed with the ballot, had the return postage prepaid, and contained the following: (a) the name and address of the landowner, (b) a declaration, under penalty of perjury, stating that the voter is the owner of record or authorized representative of the landowner entitled to vote and is the person whose name appears on the envelope, (c) the printed name, signature and address of the voter, (d) the date of signing and place of execution of

the declaration pursuant to clause (b) above, and (e) a notice that the envelope contains an official ballot and is to be opened only by the canvassing Council.

Analysis and arguments with respect to the ballot measures are hereby waived, as provided in Section 53327 of the Act and the landowners' Petitions requesting annexation of the territory identified as Annexation No. 18.

Section 8. The City Clerk shall accept the ballot of the qualified elector in the City of Reedley City Council meeting room until 7:00 p.m. on October 27, 2020, whether the ballot is personally delivered or is received by mail. The City Clerk shall have ballots available which may be marked at said location on the election day by the qualified elector.

Section 9. This Council hereby calls a special election to consider the measure described in the ballot referred to below, which election shall be held on October 27, 2020 in the regular meeting place of the City Council, City Hall Council Chambers, Reedley California. This Council further finds that the provision of Section 53326 of the Act requiring a minimum of 90 days following the adoption of this Resolution to elapse before said special election is for the protection of the qualified electors of the territory to be annexed to the District and that the voters have waived such requirement and the date for the election herein specified is established accordingly.

Section 10. The City Clerk is hereby appointed as the election official to conduct the election and shall cause to be provided to each landowner in the territory to be annexed to the District. The City Clerk shall accept the ballots of the qualified electors received prior to 7:00 p.m. on October 27, 2020, whether received by mail or by personal delivery.

WHEREAS, in proceedings conducted by this Council in accordance with the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended (the "Act"), this Council has duly adopted, after a duly noticed public hearing, Resolution No. 2020-077 calling a special election of the qualified landowner electors in the territory of land proposed to be annexed to Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 (Public Services) (the "District"); and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Resolution of Annexation, which is by this reference incorporated herein, the special election has been held and the City Clerk has filed a Canvass and Statement of Result of Election, a copy of which is attached hereto as **Exhibit A**; and

WHEREAS, this Council has reviewed said Canvass and hereby approves it; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the City Council of the City of Reedley as follows:

- Section 1. The question presented at the special election was the levy of a special tax within the territory annexed to the District, to be levied in accordance with the formula heretofore approved by this Council, all as described in Resolution No. 2020-077, a Resolution of Intention to Annex Territory to the Community Facilities District, authorizing the levy of a Special Tax and Submitting Levy of Tax to Qualified Electors, adopted September 22, 2020.
- Section 2. Pursuant to the Canvass on file with the City Clerk, the question presented at the special election was approved by the landowners of the territory annexed to the District.
- Section 3. Pursuant to the voter approval, the annexed territory is hereby declared to be fully annexed to and part of the District and this Council may levy special taxes therein as heretofore provided in these proceedings.

Section 4. It is hereby found that all prior proceedings and actions taken by this Council with respect to the District and the territory annexed thereto were valid and in conformity with the Act.

Section 5. Within 15 days of the date of adoption hereof, the City Clerk shall execute and cause to be recorded in the office of the County Recorder of the County of Fresno, an Amendment to Notice of Special Tax Lien, in the form required by Section 3117.5 of the California Streets and Highways Code.

Section 6. This Resolution shall take effect upon its adoption.



RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council approve Resolution No. 2020-089, expressing support for strengthening local control in California.

BACKGROUND

Over the last decade, the State legislature has passed numerous laws that reduce local governments' control over a variety of issues, most notably, housing and zoning. A coalition of local governments, known as "California Cities for Local Control", is coming together to advocate for restoration of local control and authority.

The League of California Cities has taken strong positions against the most extreme bills related to the usurping of local control, but is not taking a strong, active stance to promote local control on housing and zoning issues. Over the past few years, examples of housing and zoning laws which have eroded local control and authority include the establishment of Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) - numbers that cities are mandated to provide zoning for; the mandate that cities allow Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU's) on property zoned for single family homes, and the requirement that cities allow small lot sizes, regardless of how the local community feels about these items. In the last two legislative cycles, extreme laws have been proposed that would allow for multi-family units to be built on any property in a city, regardless of zoning, and that housing unit approval would be "administrative" in nature and not go to a vote of the Planning Commission or City Council for approval. Fortunately, these extreme laws have not passed. However, these laws are being brought back in various forms

each legislative cycle, indicating that the authors of these bills and other State players intend to keep bringing these, and other extreme housing and zoning bills, forward.

Resolution No 2020-089 expresses the City Council's support to retain local control over housing and zoning issues. It does not bind the City to any specific course of action, nor does it express support for any individual organization. If approved, a signed copy of the Resolution will be forwarded to the coalition of cities spearheading this effort, known as the "California Cities for Local Control".

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact to the City by approving this Resolution.

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-089

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REEDLEY EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR ACTIONS TO FURTHER STRENGTHEN LOCAL DEMOCRACY, AUTHORITY, AND CONTROL AS RELATED TO LOCAL ZONING AND HOUSING ISSUES

WHEREAS, the legislature of the State of California each year proposes, passes, and has signed into law numerous bills addressing a range of housing issues; and

WHEREAS, the legislature of the State of California does not allow sufficient time between each legislative cycle to determine if the enacted legislation is successful in bringing about the change for the State of California's housing issues; and

WHEREAS, the majority of these bills usurp the authority of local jurisdictions to determine for themselves the land use policies and practices that best suit each city and its residents, and instead impose mandates that do not take into account the needs and differences of jurisdictions throughout the State of California; and

WHEREAS, the ability of local jurisdictions to determine for themselves which projects require review beyond a ministerial approval; what parking requirements are appropriate for various neighborhoods within their jurisdiction; what plans and programs are suitable and practical for each community rather than having these decisions imposed upon cities without regard to the circumstances of each individual city; and what zoning should be allowed for residential properties is a matter of great import to the City of Reedley among other items related to local zoning and housing issues; and

WHEREAS, the City Council, of the City of Reedley feels strongly that local government is best able to assess the needs of the local community and objects to the proliferations of State legislation that deprives the duly elected local body of that ability.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the City Council of the City of Reedley resolves as follows:

- 1. The Council of the City of Reedley is opposed to the current practice of the legislature of the State of California continually proposing and passing a multitude of bills that directly impact and interfere with the ability of cities to control their own land use through the use of zoning authority that has been granted to them.
- 2. The City of Reedley will explore various ways to protect the ability of cities to retain local control over zoning as each individual city within the State of California is best suited to determine how the zoning in their city should be allocated in order to meet the housing needs of the community.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council approve the First Amendment to the City Manager's Employment Agreement.

BACKGROUND

The City Manager's Employment Agreement covers terms and conditions of the working relationship between the City of Reedley and the City Manager. Periodically, and generally when the City Manager's performance review is conducted, the Agreement is reviewed for consistency with State and federal laws. While it has been reviewed more recently, the last time the City Manager's Employment Agreement was formally amended was in 2016.

Three changes are requested for the Employment Agreement. First, Section 1.9.(a), which provides the City Manager with a thirty (30) day notice before termination, is being deleted. If the Council should terminate the City Manager's employment, it shall become effective immediately. Second, there is currently a need to amend the language in the benefits section of the termination provision to protect the City from any possible issues with the City's medical insurance provider. It is in the City's best interest that the provision language be amended to reflect that any paid insurance premiums are governed by the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA), and that any premiums paid on the employee's behalf will be remitted to the City's COBRA administrator. The final change being requested is to amend the severance provision to authorize a severance payment for the maximum number of months allowed under State law, but in no case less than 12 months, which is the length of time in the current Agreement. This provision is only activated if the City Manager is terminated by the City Council without cause. If the City Manager is terminated for cause, these provisions are not activated and she receives no severance payment.

There are no changes to the City Manager's current salary or benefits being requested or made through this Amendment. All current salary and benefit provisions remain the same.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no immediate fiscal impact to the City by approving this Amendment. The provisions only activate should the City Manager be terminated by the City Council without cause.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO AMENDED CITY MANAGER EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This First Amendment to Amended City Manager Employment Agreement ("First Amendment") is entered into by and between the City of Reedley, a California municipal corporation ("City"), and Nicole R. Zieba ("Zieba"), and is effective as on October ___, 2020 ("Effective Date").

- A. On August 22, 2011, City and Zieba entered into that certain City Manager Employment Agreement ("Agreement").
- B. On November 27, 2012, City and Zieba entered into a First Amendment to City Manager Employment Agreement ("First Amendment to Agreement").
- C. On August 13, 2013, City and Zieba entered into a Second Amendment to City Manager Employment Agreement ("Second Amendment to Agreement") which is incorporated herein by this reference.
- D. On November 8, 2016, City and Zieba entered into a comprehensive Amended City Manager Employment Agreement ("Amended Agreement") which replaced and superseded the Agreement, First Amendment to Agreement, and Second Amendment to Agreement, which Amended Agreement is incorporated herein by reference.
 - E. City and Zieba both desire to make amendments to the Amended Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in view of the above recitals and in consideration for the mutual promises set forth in the Amended Agreement and herein, City and Zieba agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Amendment to Section 9 of the Agreement</u>. Section 9 of the Amended Agreement is amended to read in its entirety as follows:
 - 9. <u>Termination and Severance</u>. Subject to the provisions in this Section, nothing in this Agreement shall prevent, limit or otherwise interfere with the right of the City Council to terminate this Agreement and the employment of Zieba at any time, at the sole discretion of the City Council with or without cause, in accordance with the provisions of Title 1, Chapter 6 of the Reedley City Code, and in so doing, Zieba acknowledges that she shall not have, and hereby waives, all rights to a hearing or to an appeal of any kind. This waiver includes, specifically, a waiver of the notice and hearing provisions as found in Title 1, Chapter 6 of the Reedley City Code. Upon termination of this Agreement by the City, except for termination with cause, Zieba shall be entitled to severance compensation and benefits as provided in Section 9(a) herein.
 - (a) <u>Termination Without Cause</u>. The majority of the City Council may terminate this Agreement at any time without cause by providing at-least thirty (30) days written notice to Zieba. In the event of termination without cause, Zieba shall be entitled to severance compensation as follows:

- (i) a lump sum severance payment equal to the maximum number of months of salary allowed by applicable State law, but in no case less than twelve (12) months of salary, less any required deductions, with payment to be made on the date the termination is effective; and
- (ii) a continuation of the health, dental, and optical insurance coverages and benefits described in Section 5 of the Agreement until Zieba begins employment elsewhere as a full time City Manager, or until Zieba begins employment elsewhere (in any position) which provides health, dental, and optical insurance coverage, or until the maximum number of months allowed under the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985 (COBRA) twelve (12) months after termination, whichever occurs first. City shall remit payment of all premiums to the COBRA administrator.
- (b) <u>Termination for Cause</u>. The City may terminate this Agreement immediately for cause. If Zieba is terminated for cause, Zieba shall not be entitled to the severance compensation and benefits under Section 9(a) herein.
- (c) For Cause Defined. Cause shall be defined as willful misconduct as defined in Title 1, Chapter 6, Section 9 of the Reedley City Code and conviction of a felony or a misdemeanor crime involving an act or acts of moral turpitude. In such an instance, Zieba's sole remedy shall be a judicial action in declaratory relief to determine whether there was substantial evidence of willful misconduct or a conviction of a felony or a misdemeanor crime involving an act or acts of moral turpitude. If a final determination from a court is that there was not substantial evidence to support termination for cause, Zieba shall receive the severance compensation and benefits provided in this Agreement.
- (d) <u>Termination Defined</u>. Termination shall mean removal from office or a request by the <u>City Council</u> that the <u>City ManagerZieba</u> resign. Termination shall not mean a <u>voluntary resignation or retirement by Zieba</u>, or a reduction of benefits generally applicable to all management employees.
- (e) Resignation. Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent, limit or otherwise interfere with Zieba's right to resign or retire from her employment with the City at any time. Zieba shall give not less than forty-five (45) days written notice, and shall make her best efforts to give at least sixty (60) days written notice to the City prior to the effective date of resignation or retirement. If Zieba resigns or retires voluntarily (without a request from the City Council to resign), Zieba shall not be entitled to the severance compensation and benefits under Section 9(a) herein.
- 2. <u>All Other Terms Remain in Effect</u>. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, all other terms and conditions of the Amended Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, and shall be interpreted so as to give full force and effect to this First Amendment.

Brief History

- 2006 Reedley was experiencing rapid growth WWTP was nearing capacity
- City Council was faced with a decision to expand the WWTP or start denying new development applications
- ► WWTP expansion began in 2007 \$31.1 million of debt to pay for the expansion project.
 - ► SRF Loan Program
 - ▶ 30 year Wastewater Revenue Bond

HISTORY CONT.

- 2008 Housing Market Crashed- development came to a screeching halt.
- ▶ The new State-of -the-art WWTP was completed.
- Sewer rates had to be increased 53% over 2 years to pay for annual debt obligation.
- Reedley's sewer rates surpassed neighboring cities.

New Development

- Currently, development is on the rise in Reedley with approx. 700 new residential units approved for construction.
- An additional 300-400 new residential units going through approval process.
- Reedley's WWTP is poised and prepared to accommodate new development and growth
- ► Additional growth will take pressure off of sewer rates

Reasons for inflationary increases

- Aging infrastructure 72 miles of sewer main pipeline. Capital project costs continue to increase.
- Materials and Labor costs increase each year.
- State mandates.
- Inflationary increases for future years if needed are based on the Department of Labor's Consumer Price Index.
- Small inflationary increases alleviate the need for large rate increases in the future.

Last 5 years of Sewer Rates

- ► City of Reedley Sewer Utility
 - ▶ 2015 No increase
 - ▶2016 No increase
 - ▶2017 Inflationary increase (2.4%)
 - ▶ 2018 Inflationary increase (2.5%)
 - ▶2019 No increase

Others – last 5 years

City of Dinuba Sewer Utility rates (2016 Sewer Rate Study)

- ▶ 2016 25% increase
- ▶ 2017 12% increase
- ▶2018 No increase
- ▶ 2019 6% increase
- ▶ 2020 4% increase

Comprehensive Sewer Rate Study

- Required by law
- Outside consulting firm
- January 14, 2020 Council approved an agreement with HDR Engineering to perform the study
- Actual cost of providing sewer services
- Proposed sewer utility rates resulting from the study cannot exceed the cost of providing the service







Purpose of the Wastewater Study

- Provide a sufficient level of revenues to operate and maintain the City's wastewater system
- Develop equitable and cost-based rates
 - Meet the intent of Proposition 218
- Reflect prudent financial planning criteria
 - Maintain target debt service coverage (DSC) ratio
 - Prudent rate funding of capital
 - Meet target reserve balances
- Develop the study using generally accepted methodologies
 - Tailored to the City's wastewater system operation and unique customer characteristics



Developing Cost-Based Wastewater Rates

Revenue Requirement

Compares the revenue of the utility to the expenses to evaluate the level of overall wastewater rates



Cost of Service

Equitably allocates the revenue requirement between the various customer classes of service




Design rates for each class of service to meet the revenue needs of the water utility, along with any other rate design goals and objectives

Cost of Service Analysis – Key Assumptions

- Analysis is based on the FY 2020-21 revenue requirement
 - Rate setting period
 - Reflects overall revenue needs = 2.0% annual increase
- Functionalized the revenue requirement
 - Collection
 - o Treatment
- Allocate costs into the appropriate components
 - Volume / Flow
 - Biochemical Oxygen Demand
 - Total Suspended Solids
 - Customer
- Distribute costs proportionally to the corresponding customer class
 - Meets the requirements of Proposition 218

 - Cost of service must now demonstrate cost basis for each customer class
 - Unit costs are the basis for the proposed rates
- First cost of service study since the completion of metering all customers' water usage
- Rate structure maintained for all customer classes
 - Rate level adjusted based on the revenue requirement and cost of service results
