PROCLAMATION OF THE CITY OF REEDLEY



IN ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCTOBER 6 - 12, 2019.

WHEREAS, the city of Reedley, CA is committed to ensuring the safety and security of all those living in and visiting Reedley; and

WHEREAS, fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire; and

WHEREAS, home fires killed 2,630 people in the United States in 2017, according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), and fire departments in the United States responded to 357,000 home fires; and

WHEREAS, the majority of U.S. fire deaths (4 out of 5) occur at home each year; and

WHEREAS, the fire death rate per 1000 home fires reported to U.S. fire departments was 4 percent higher in 2017 than in 1980; and

WHEREAS, when the smoke alarm sounds Reedley's residents may have less than two minutes to escape to safety; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents who have planned and practiced a home fire escape plan are more prepared and will therefore be more likely to survive a fire; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should make a home escape plan, drawing a map of each level of the home, showing all doors and windows; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should practice the home fire escape plan with everyone in the household, including visitors; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should practice the home fire escape drill at least twice a year, during the day and at night; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should teach children to escape on their own in case adults can't help them; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should make sure everyone in the home knows how to call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from a cell phone or a neighbor's phone; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should practice using different ways out; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents in a real emergency should get low and go under the smoke to get out quickly; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents should get out and stay out, never going back inside the home for people, pets, or things; and

WHEREAS, Reedley's residents are responsive to public education measures and are able to take action to increase their safety from fire, especially in their homes; and

WHEREAS, the 2019 Fire Prevention Week[™] theme, "Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape!™" effectively serves to remind us that we need to take personal steps to increase our safety from fire.

THEREFORE, I Frank Pinon, Mayor of Reedley do hereby proclaim October 6-12, 2019, as Fire Prevention Week throughout this city, and I urge all the people of Reedley to be aware of their surroundings, look for available ways out in the event of a fire or other emergency, respond when the smoke alarm sounds by exiting the building immediately, and to support and participate in the many public safety activities and efforts of Reedley's fire and emergency services during Fire Prevention Week 2019.

Assistant City Manager, Paul Melikian addressed Council on multiple items as they pertain to the adoption of the annual budget. City Manager, Nicole Zieba asked that each item be adopted separately as they were presented to Council. Mr. Melikian stated that staff recommended the adoption of 2019-2020 fiscal year budget as discussed at prior meetings and related fiscal items requiring approval as part of the annual budget process. Mr. Melikian reviewed each item individually and stated that no motioned had been made by Council that would change the proposed budget and that unless there were changes made by minute order that evening the budget would then be adopted as proposed. Mr. Melikian added that several of the resolutions were routinely brought forward with the adopted budget, such as the Master Salary table that appoints the compensation table for all employees of the city. Mr. Melikian reviewed all proposed changes on the Master Salary Table and the Salary and Benefit schedule for Unrepresented. He explained the amortization of the General Fund Reserve loan to the Reedley Airport fund and the benefit of extending the repayment from 2026-2034 which would lower the annual payment from approximately \$30,000 to \$15,000 and would free up the difference to be used for matching funds for State and Federal grants for critical projects at the Reedley Airport. The last item was discussed at the last budget workshop which was essentially Lozano Smith's request for a rate increase that would not take place until another year.

City Manager, Nicole Zieba and Assistant City Manager, Paul Melikian provided an overview along with a discussion on the General Fund Forecast for fiscal years of 2020-2025. In an effort to determine what to do with the budget, staff felt that a critical component was to provide Council a forecast looking at the next five years. There were many assumptions that were made, however there were numbers that came back that were very concerning and they wanted to share that information with Council, community and staff. RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council deny a claim received on July 31, 2019 from Melody Huebert. The claim has been forwarded to AIMS for further investigation.

BACKGROUND

According to the Claim Form filed by Melody Huebert, on July 26, 2019, in front of 308 W. Sasaki Ave, a branch from a City tree cracked and fell on her parked vehicle. The claimant alleged that the branch left scratches and dents to the passenger side of the vehicle. The claimant was seeking \$1,565.19 in damages from the City for vehicle repairs with an estimate from Rod's Body and Paint.

According to discussion with City staff, the City was unaware and did not receive prior notice and/or work orders with regard to any potentially dangerous and/or hazardous conditions associated with the subject tree prior to the incident of July 26, 2019. Furthermore, the claimant did not present information to establish that the City knew about and/or created the dangerous condition. The claimant did not provide information that the City negligently maintained the tree, whether by improper pruning, topping, failure to water (which is the property owner's responsibility) or any other action which would have weakened the tree. Additionally, the claimant did not provide any information to establish that the city had any actual or constructive notice. The claimant would be required by law to do so before a public entity could be held financially responsible for any damages.

AIMS found no evidence of negligence and/or liability on the part of the City, therefore Staff is recommending rejection of the subject claim.

Per Government Code Section 912.4, the City Council must act upon a claim within 45 days after receipt. If there is no official action by Council, the claim is deemed to be rejected on the last day. Denial by minute order action provides a clearly defined rejection date and allows AIMS to tender the claim to the contractor sooner so that the matter is resolved in a timely manner.

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council adopts Resolution 2019-078 pertaining to the for-mentioned funding agreement and Project Director designation for the George Cox water consolidation project.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

George Cox is the owner of 20 homes located on Zumwalt Avenue, between Duff Avenue and Dinuba Avenue. The homes are located in an unincorporated area of Fresno County and sit adjacent to the City limits. Mr. Cox has two water wells that supply potable water to the renters of 19 homes as well as Mr. Cox's primary residence. Current residents of the 19 homes fall under the Severely Disadvantaged category. Mr. Cox has a permit from the State Water Board to operate his water system. Due to DBCP contamination in both of his wells, the State Water Board has placed Mr. Cox on notice that he will no longer be able to use his wells at the end of 2019.

State officials and Mr. Cox met with the City at the end of 2016 to discuss the connection of City water service to the George Cox water system in order to supply the 20 residential homes with clean potable water. State officials strongly encouraged the City water connection project, which would include the complete abandonment of the George Cox water system and subsequent connection into the City's water system.

PREVIOUS COUNCIL ACTION

On December 12, 2017, the City Council approved a water service agreement with George Cox to provide water to the 20 residential homes. The agreement ensures proper connections will be made to the City water main and current rate payers will not be liable for any cost of the service extension project. The agreement also states that the City will not be responsible for the maintenance of any water piping or any part of the water service extension project that is located outside of the City limit line. The City will only be responsible for supplying clean potable water to the City limit line, which is approximately 40 feet

from an existing water main.

Also on December 12, 2017, Council adopted Resolutions 2017-101 and 2017-100 which authorized the City Manager to sign a financial assistance application with the State Water Board to fund the project and also stated the City's intention to incur project expenditures up to \$165,720 for full reimbursement of eligible expenditures.

FISCAL IMPACT

Through the funding agreement, the State Water Board will cover the total cost of the project from a Proposition 1 grant. In the unlikely event that grant funds are not sufficient to cover all costs, the City's agreement with Mr. Cox states that he would then be responsible for any and all non-funded associated costs of the service extension project.

BACKGROUND

On August 21, 2018 the City and County entered into Agreement 18-500 for Reedley Street Improvements Project (Phase IX) Project No. 18571 (Project) for the widening of Myrtle Avenue from Cedar and Buttonwillow Avenue, whereby \$149,385 in CDBG allocated funds were made available to fund this project.

On May 28, 2019, the Engineering Department took a consent item to City Council to reject all bids received for the Project bid opening held on April 18, 2019 and to modify the scope of work from Myrtle Avenue widening to Buttonwillow Avenue widening from Myrtle to North Avenue.

Due to change in the scope of work, the project total has increased to \$762,519, whereby \$411,715 is to be provided by the County from a combination of the City's remaining balance of CDBG funds, and the City's 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 CDBG allocation. The local funds will come from a variety of sources including Measure C, Vehicle Impact Fees, Development Impact Fee and Water Enterprise Funds.

Amendment No. 1 to Agreement 18-500 will revise the CDBG funds from \$149,385 to \$411,715. The proposed funding summary in the City-County Agreement for CDBG Project No. 18571 has been

amended as follows:

FISCAL IMPACT

Approval of Amendment 1 to Agreement 18-500 will appropriate an additional \$262,330 for a total of \$411,715 to fund design and construction expenses for the Project. Due to the increased Project cost, the City's local fund contribution will be approximately \$350,804.

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution No. 2019-070 approving and confirming the report of delinquent public nuisance abatement costs (the Report) and requesting a new direct levy be submitted to Fresno County in order to impose a special assessment (lien) on the delinquent parcel located at 181 Justine Avenue.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of Reedley has incurred costs in the amount of \$19,384.15 to abate Municipal Code nuisance violations at 181 Justine Avenue, Reedley, CA, APN 370-131-07. The City began attempts to abate the nuisance violations in early 2019. Approval of the attached resolution will authorize the filing of a notice of lien on the property in the Fresno County Recorder's Office which shall become a special assessment against the property added to the next regular tax bill levied.

BACKGROUND

The property located at 181 Justine Avenue in the City of Reedley was subject to code enforcement action as Council approved Resolution 2019-001 on January 8, 2019 declaring a public nuisance and approving demolition of the burned-out structure. The legal owner of record, Lupe Rodriguez, is deceased however all correspondence is required to be sent to the property owner, and notices are posted on the property to inform any interested persons. The property owner has been 1) given notice of the violation, 2) an opportunity to correct, 3) have failed to do so, 4) issued a citation, and 5) failed to pay the fine and costs involved for abatement. A statement was sent to the property owner demanding payment as required by Reedley Municipal Code 5-12-13, and a notice was posted on the property to provide notice to any interested person. The deadline imposed for full repayment of costs was July 2, 2019. The property owner is responsible for all costs the City incurred to abate the public nuisance conditions on the property. No heir or interested person has come forward to claim the property, perform the abatement, or pay the abatement costs incurred by the City.

The City charges reasonable fees associated with actions performed abating public nuisances related to real property conditions. Property owners are notified both prior to and after fees are charged by mail and given an opportunity to appeal.

Per the City of Reedley Municipal Code 1-12-9(C), any fees and fines not paid are subject to a special assessment placed against the parcel in question. These special assessments may then be placed on the tax roll of the parcel.

The attached Report identifies and lists the delinquent amounts to be recovered at \$19,384.15.

FISCAL IMPACT

The special assessment levy on public nuisance abatement costs allows the City to attempt to recover funds spent in the enforcement of the City of Reedley Municipal Code. The placement of these charges on the tax roll is found to be the most cost-effective method of collection of unpaid fees. These charges will be due and payable with the property taxes for the property, and if not paid, the property may be sold at a tax delinquency sale, and the City may recover some or all of the charges at that time.

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2018 and again on June 19, 2018, the single family residence located at 181 Justine Avenue, Reedley ("Property") was severely damaged by fire; and

WHEREAS, following the fires, the residence was not repaired, removed, or replaced, and the owner of the Property, Lupe Rodriguez, died without beginning any repairs to the Property; and

WHEREAS, following numerous unsuccessful attempts to locate Mrs. Rodriguez's heirs or any other responsible party for the Property, and all other code enforcement efforts having proven unsuccessful to having the Property repaired, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing on January 8, 2019, and adopted Resolution 2019-001 declaring that the Property constituted a public nuisance and ordering the nuisance to be abated in accordance with applicable provisions of the Reedley Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, following the adoption of Resolution 2019-01, and after providing all required notices of the abatement order for the Property, no responsible party performed the necessary abatement; and

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2019, the City obtained an Abatement Warrant issued by the Superior Court of California, for the County of Fresno, in Case No. 19CECG00992, authorizing the City to perform the required abatement activities on the Property; and

WHEREAS, the City contracted with Yanez Construction to perform all the required abatement activities, and Yanez completed all abatement activities on about April 16, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the City has maintained an itemized account of the expenses of abatement incurred by the City for the abatement activities on the Property, and on May 2, 2019, the City mailed an invoice with the itemized billing statement in accordance with Reedley Municipal Code Section 5-12-13(B), and also posted a copy of the invoice and billing statement at the Property; and

WHEREAS, the City received no objection to the billing statement and received no payments of any portion of the abatement costs reflected in the billing statement within sixty (60) days of mailing and posting the billing statement; and

WHEREAS, the City having received no objection to the billing statement of abatement costs and no payment for the abatement costs, a Notice of Hearing on September 24, 2019 to confirm the abatement costs incurred at 181 Justine Avenue as a special assessment and authorizing a notice of lien to recover the abatement costs ("Hearing Notice"), was posted at the Property and published in the Reedley Exponent / Mid-Valley Times on or before September 12, 2019; and

WHEREAS, any responsible party(ies) has(ve) been provided notice by the City of this hearing by reasonable and lawful means and given reasonable opportunity to pay the abatement costs owed to the City.

NOW THEREFORE, the City Council, having reviewed the Hearing Notice, staff report and attachments for this matter, which are incorporated herein by reference, and after receiving, reviewing, and considering any comments, arguments, and materials presented at the duly noticed hearing, hereby resolves as follows:

- 1. The billing statement attached hereto as Exhibit A is approved and the abatement costs and associated publishing fees and legal fees reflected therein, along with such additional reasonable costs related to this abatement that may be incurred by the City hereinafter, are confirmed as a special assessment on the property located at 181 Justine Avenue.
- 2. This Resolution shall take effect upon its adoption, and the City Manager, City Attorney, City Clerk, and other appropriate City staff are hereby authorized to take such further action as necessary to prepare and record a notice of lien in accordance with Reedley Municipal Code sections 1-12-9 and/or 5-12-13, as applicable, and deliver a copy of the of the notice of lien to the County of Fresno auditor-controller/treasurer-tax collector or other appropriate county official for collection on the property tax roll.

Staff recommends that the City Council take the following action:

- Hold a Public Hearing on the Introduction and First Reading of Ordinance No. 2019-003, an Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Reedley Approving Change of Zone Application 2019-2, and authorizing the amendment of the official zoning map of the City of Reedley
- Receive Environmental Assessment No. 2019-11, a finding that no new environmental document is required for this project, dated August 1, 2019

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Ordinance No. 2019-003 (Change of Zone Application No. 2019-2) pertains to the reclassification of five contiguous properties (APNs 370-070-54, 370-070-72S, 370-070-73, 370-070-75S, and 370-070-92), located east of the terminus of South Hemlock Avenue, within the boundaries of the southern side of East Curtis Avenue, the western side of South Buttonwillow Avenue, and the northern side of the Reedley Parkway, from the MP (*Planned Industrial*) zone district to the MH (*Heavy Industrial*) zone district designation. Letters have been sent out and information has been made available to the property owners affected by this change of zone application. The proposed Change of Zone Application is consistent with the 2030 General Plan Heavy Industrial Planned Land Use Designation and is compatible with the surrounding zone districts.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION/BACKGROUND

The five subject properties proposed to be reclassified with a MH (Heavy Industrial) zone district are shown below and can be described as follows:

The subject properties are identified in the Reedley General Plan Update 2030 with a Heavy Industrial Planned Land Use Designation, which provides the opportunity for development of a full range of manufacturing, processing and storage facilities. The current underlying zone district designation is the MP (*Planned Industrial*) zone district, which is generally a more restrictive zone district and does not permit as many industrial uses as the MH (Heavy Industrial) zone district does. This zone district is located within the plan area of the Southeast Industrial Area Specific Plan, which was adopted by the City Council in 1986 (Resolution No. 3732). This specific plan was incorporated into Reedley's 2030 General Plan when the General Plan Update was adopted in 2014.

^{**}Property managers attended the Planning Commission meeting on behalf of the property owners and did not have objections to the proposed change of zone

The subject properties are currently developed with industrial uses. If any expansions or a change of use were to occur, staff would have to determine whether the project is consistent with the General Plan. In this case, the MH (*Heavy Industrial*) zone district would be the most consistent and compatible zone district within the Heavy Industrial General Plan Planned Land Use Designation.

The proposed MH (*Heavy Industrial*) zone district is consistent with the Table 2-4 Planned Land Use and Zone District Consistency Matrix (GPU, Page 30). Staff has determined that the MH (*Heavy Industrial*) zone district is a more compatible zone district for the subject properties and the existing businesses.

LAND USE

The overall guiding land use principles described in the General Plan are designed to provide an overall direction to assist decision-makers in determining the appropriateness of a request to changing either a planned land use or zone district designation. Those guiding principles are described in detailed statements of goals and polices outlined in the approved GPU (GPU, 2.3 Land Use Element Guiding Principles).

Moreover there are also specific Land Use Element goals and policies, which when applied, would further indicate the appropriateness of the change of zone application. In this case, these goals and policies further support the zone district reclassification, as well as, the potential future approval and/or development of the site for future businesses. Below are those directly applicable goal and policy statements:

- LU 2.7Q Provide adequate sites and acreage for a wide range of industrial development.
- LU 2.7.53 [Heavy Industrial designated land] Shall mean land designated for the full range of manufacturing, processing, and storage activities.
- LU 2.7.59 New heavy industrial uses should be encouraged to concentrate in the southeastern portion of the Planning Area where they are downwind from other less intensive uses.
- LU 2.7.62 Protect heavy industrial sites from encroachment by residential and other sensitive uses through appropriate zoning and interface standards.

Therefore, the appropriateness of the proposed project has been examined with respect to its consistency with guiding land use principles, goals and policies of the Reedley General Plan Update 2030 and regulatory standards set forth in the Reedley Municipal Code and its compatibility with surrounding existing or proposed uses. These factors have been evaluated as described above. Upon consideration of this evaluation, it can be concluded that the Change of Zone Application No. 2019-2 is appropriate for the subject property.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

On February 25, 2014, the City Council certified the Final Environmental Impact Report (SCH No. 2010031106), which was prepared for the proposed GPU pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The EIR provides a comprehensive single programmatic environmental document that will allow the City of Reedley to carry out the proposed project and evaluates direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts of the proposed project, as well as project alternatives in accordance with the provisions set forth in CEQA and the CEQA Guidelines.

Pursuant to Section 15168(c)(2), the City as the lead agency, has determined that Ordinance No. 2019-003 would have no effects that were not examined in the program EIR and that no new effects could occur or no new mitigation measures would be required as a result of the implementation of this ordinance. Staff provided a comprehensive analysis and review of the proposed amendments to the Reedley Municipal Code, as shown in Environmental Assessment No. 2019-11 (Attachment 2), and determined the results to be within the scope of the project described in the Program EIR.

It has also been determined that no new effect could occur beyond those identified and analyzed in the Program EIR (SCH No. 2010031106), and that no new mitigation measures are required for this project beyond those set forth in the program EIR (SCH No. 2010031106), pursuant to Section 15168(c)(2). Therefore, no new environmental document is required for this Project.

COMMITTEE/COMMISSION REVIEW/ACTIONS

In July of 2019, City staff mailed a letter to the property owners providing information about the proposed change of zone and indicated that the change of zone would be done at no cost to the property owner in an effort by the City to offer assistance to maintain consistency with the adopted General Plan.

On August 15, 2019, the Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on this application. The Commission received a written staff report and presentation, and invited the public to comment. No person spoke in objection to the project. After hearing all the testimony the City of Reedley Planning Commission, using their independent judgment, recommended to the City Council adoption of Environmental Assessment 2019-11, and adoption of Ordinance No. 2019-003 (Change of Zone Application No. 2019-2). See Attachment 3.

- Section 5. The City Council hereby APPROVES Change of Zone Application No. 2019-2 and incorporates the changes reflected therein into the zoning law and map of the City of Reedley, as reflected on Exhibit A; and
- Section 6. The City Council hereby APPROVES the amendment to the Official Zoning Map and ADOPTS said updated map as the City's Official Zoning Map; and
- Section 7. The City Clerk is hereby directed to cause a summary of this ordinance to be published by one insertion in a newspaper of general circulation in the community at least five (5) days prior to adoption and again within fifteen (15) days after its adoption.
- Section 8. This Ordinance does not need to be codified because there is no text in the Municipal Code that needs to be revised; and
- Section 9. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its passage and adoption, as certified by the City Clerk.









RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council of the City of Reedley take the following actions:

- Hold a Public Hearing on the Introduction and First Reading of Ordinance No. 2019-004, an Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Reedley Repealing and Replacing in its Entirety Title 10, Chapter 25, Section 5, Pertaining to the Industrial Use Matrix
- Receive Environmental Assessment No. 2019-12, a finding that no new environmental document is required for this project, dated August 1, 2019

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Ordinance No. 2019-004 (Text Amendment Application No. 2019-1) is proposing to repeal and replace Title 10, Chapter 25, Section 5, which pertains to the list of permitted and conditional industrial land uses. Ordinance No. 2019-004 was initiated on July 26, 2019 (See Attachment 3). The intent of Text Amendment Application No. 2019-1 is to provide for more opportunities for industrial development within existing industrial zone districts by adding new industrial land uses to the list or recommending that existing land uses be modified in their language or whether they are permitted conditionally or by-right. The proposed text amendment is in conformance with the objectives, policies, principles and standards of the Reedley General Plan 2030.

BACKGROUND

The List of Permitted and Conditional Use Matrix (Chapter 10-25) was substantially amended in 2014 and provided more types of land uses and greater usability. Staff wishes to continue to make amendments to the Land Use Matrix and is recommending that the Chapter 25 Industrial Use Matrix be revised to add additional land uses that were left out during previous amendments or recommending that existing land uses be modified in their language or whether they are permitted conditionally or by-right. These revisions are based on customer inquiries of uses that would reasonably be allowed in certain zone districts, but ultimately they were not listed in the Chapter 25 Matrix, or were listed as conditional uses when those uses would reasonably be allowed by-right.

Additions to the Reedley Municipal Code text as proposed in Ordinance No. 2019-004 are shown with underlined and italicized font effects, while text to be removed is shown with the strikethrough font effect.

There are more permitted uses in the MP (*Planned Industrial*) zone district proposed through Text Amendment Application No. 2019-1 in order to provide a smooth transition for the eventual removal of the MP (*Planned Industrial*) zone district designation.

Conditions of Approval are applied to a Conditional Use Permit Application and are subject to approval by the Planning Commission, but Conditions of Approval can still be applied to a use that is allowed by-right through the Site Plan Review process. For new construction, Section 10-9-7 of the Reedley Municipal Code (RMC) states that no use shall be constructed on any lot or site in an M (Industrial) district until a site plan is submitted and approved in accordance with Title 10, Chapter 19 (Site Plan Review). RMC Title 10, Chapter 19, Section 6 authorizes the application of conditions of approval to a site plan review application that are necessary to protect the public health, safety and general welfare.

Uses that are more commercial in nature that are allowed in the ML (*Light Industrial*) zone district designation can be found in the Commercial/Office Use Matrix (Title 10, Chapter 25, Section 4).

PUBLIC NOTICING

A public hearing notice was published in the Mid-Valley Times on September 12, 2019. See Attachment 4.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

On February 25, 2014, the City Council certified the Final Environmental Impact Report (SCH No. 2010031106), which was prepared for the proposed GPU pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The EIR provides a comprehensive single programmatic environmental document that will allow the City of Reedley to carry out the proposed project and evaluates direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts of the proposed project, as well as project alternatives in accordance with the provisions set forth in CEQA and the CEQA Guidelines.

Pursuant to Section 15168(c)(2), the City as the lead agency, has determined that Ordinance No. 2019-004 would have no effects that were not examined in the program EIR and that no new effects could occur or no new mitigation measures would be required as a result of the

implementation of this ordinance. Staff provided a comprehensive analysis and review of the proposed amendments to the Reedley Municipal Code, and determined the results to be within the scope of the project described in the Program EIR.

It has also been determined that no new effect could occur beyond those identified and analyzed in the Program EIR (SCH No. 2010031106), and that no new mitigation measures are required for this project beyond those set forth in the program EIR (SCH No. 2010031106), pursuant to Section 15168(c)(2). Therefore, no new environmental document is required for this Project.

PLANNING COMMISSION

The Planning Commission received a staff report and presentation relating to Text Amendment Application No. 2019-1 (Ordinance No. 2019-004), and related environmental assessment 2019-12, at their regularly scheduled meeting of August 15, 2019. They opened the meeting to receive comments from the public regarding the item, and received no comments. Via Planning Commission Resolution 2019-9, the Planning Commission unanimously recommended that the City Council accept Environmental Assessment 2019-12 and introduce Ordinance 2019-004 for adoption. See Attachment 5.

It has also been determined that no new effect could occur beyond those identified and analyzed in the Program EIR (SCH No. 2010031106), and that no new mitigation measures are required for this project beyond those set forth in the program EIR (SCH No. 2010031106), pursuant to Section 15168(c)(2). Therefore, no new environmental document is required for this Project.

Several topic areas within the Reedley Zoning Ordinance are being updated and readied for Council consideration in order to implement the 2030 General Plan and to generate more economic development activity by reducing barriers for development.

The List of Permitted and Conditional Use Matrix (Chapter 10-25) was substantially amended in 2014 and provided more types of land uses and greater usability. Staff is recommending that the Chapter 25 Industrial Use Matrix be revised by adding additional land uses that were left out during previous amendments or recommending that existing land uses be modified in their language or whether they are permitted conditionally or by-right. These revisions are based on customer inquiries of uses that would reasonably be allowed in certain zone districts, but ultimately they were not listed in the Chapter 25 Matrix, or were listed as conditional uses when those uses would reasonably be allowed by-right.

Staff recommends that the City Manager initiate the proposed text amendment to the Reedley Municipal Code Title 10, Chapter 25, Section 5, List of Permitted and Conditional Use Matrix.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Staff recommends the rejection of the low bid based upon the following: incorrect information submitted in the bid, failure to adhere to the bidder qualifications requirement as required in the City's bid document, and on the grounds described in the attached recommendation of the Public Works Director following the hearing with the low bidder.
- B. Staff also recommends the adoption of Resolution No. 2019-081 awarding a construction Page 1 of 4

contract to the second low bidder, Smith Construction Company Inc. for the construction of wellhead TCP treatment facilities for water wells 13, and 14 in the amount of \$949,875.09 and grant the City Manager authority to approve and sign contract change orders up to an amount equal to 10% (\$94,987.50) of the contract amount.

C. Finally, Staff also recommends the adoption of Resolution 2019-082 amending the 2019-2020 Budget to appropriate \$1,044,863 from the Ground Water Treatment fund for the aforementioned project.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of Reedley has three municipal water wells that have tested at levels exceeding the State mandated maximum contaminate level for TCP in potable water. Last year the City received settlement money from responsible parties to be used to install TCP treatment facilities at the three well sites.

The entire scope of work includes three phases:

Phase One: Procurement of TCP Treatment Vessels and GAC materials for all three wells.

Phase Two: Construction and site work at wells 13 and 14 to prepare for treatment vessels.

Phase Three: Construction and site work for well 12 to prepare for treatment vessels.

Phase one was approved and awarded by the City Council on February 12, 2019, and construction of the treatment vessels is nearing completion.

The project outlined in this staff report for Council's consideration and approval is Phase two, which includes all of the site preparation, infrastructure, pipe work, installation of the vessels, and associated SCADA and electrical work for wells 13 and 14.

Phase three is in the final planning stages and should be ready to go out to bid shortly.

On July 10, 2019, the City of Reedley began solicitation for sealed bids for the project. On August 1, 2019 the City conducted a bid opening for the project and the City received 6 bids ranging from a low of \$916,186 to a high of 1,432,580. The Engineer's Estimate for the project was \$1,009,400. Following the bid opening, the apparent low bidder was Steve Dovali Construction (SDC).

After a thorough review of the bid submitted by SDC it was determined that bid requirements were not met. The bid document contained a Bidder's Qualifications requirement in which the contractor must list three projects previously completed that have included GAC treatment facilities.

The bid document specifically stated:

"Systems cited in experience submittals shall have been downflow, pressure-type configurations using similar vessel diameter and design as this project".

SDC included three references for previous GAC wellhead projects in its bid. Those references were contacted, and each indicated that none of the three referenced projects contained GAC

potable water treatment systems. Accordingly, based on a review of the listed references, SDC did not meet the qualification requirements specified in the bid documents for this project.

SDC was informed of the information received from its listed references and its apparent lack of qualification to perform the project, and was given the opportunity to submit any information that would rebut the information received from the three listed references and establish that the three reference projects listed in its bid included GAC treatment facilities. A hearing was scheduled to be held on September 5, 2019, for SDC to meet with the Public Works Director to present any information and evidence.

Before the hearing, SDC submitted an envelope to the Public Works Director containing various documents. Upon reviewing the documents and contacting the additional references provided therein, it was discovered that none of the information provided by SDC was related to the three projects listed in its submitted bid. Rather, the documents and information submitted referred to other projects that SDC had previously completed, not the three projects listed in its bid.

The hearing was held on September 5th as scheduled. At the hearing, SDC admitted that none of the three reference projects listed in its bid included the required GAC treatment facilities as had been stated in the bid, and confirmed that those three projects were listed in its bid by mistake. Notwithstanding the mistake, SDC requested that the City consider the other reference projects SDC had submitted after the formal bid opening.

After considering all the bids submitted, the information received from references listed in submitted bids, information submitted after the bid opening by SDC, and the information provided by SDC at the September 5th hearing, and considering the applicable legal authority, the Public Works Director issued a written recommendation for award of the project. That recommendation is attached to this staff report, and describes the reasoning for the recommendation that SDC's bid be rejected as nonresponsive, and the contract be awarded to the second low bidder as the lowest responsible bidder who submitted a responsive bid. Based on the attached written recommendation, which is incorporated herein and made part of the record for this item, it is recommended that SDC's bid be rejected as nonresponsive based upon incorrect information submitted on the bid and the failure to adhere to the bidder qualifications requirement as outlined in the bid form.

Following the recommended rejection of SDC's bid, staff recommends that the construction contract be awarded to Smith Construction Company, Inc. as the lowest responsive bid. The bid received from Smith Construction Company, Inc. including the previous project references listed in the bid were reviewed and verified by City staff and the City's consultant engineer. Smith is a responsible bidder, and Smith's bid was responsive to the requirements of the bid form.

BACKGROUND

Well 14 is located at the Reedley Sports Park. This well is the City's workhorse and one of the top producing wells in the City. It is also used to fill the City's 1.5 million gallon water storage tank. The well currently has four filter vessels which contain Granulated Activated Carbon (GAC). GAC is a proven method to filter and remove certain chemicals, such as TCP and

DBCP, from water. When the GAC has to be changed out, which is approximately every 12 months, the well must be shut down during the process. The installation of four additional GAC vessels will allow the City to keep the well operational even when change out is occurring.

Well 13 is located on Parlier Avenue, just west of Buttonwillow Avenue. Water tested from this well exceeded the State's adopted MCL for TCP, and has been off-line since that time. This well is important for servicing the north east section of the City. The City plans to install two GAC treatment vessels at this location. It is not a large production well, thus two vessels are sufficient for treatment.

FISCAL IMPACT

A reduction of \$1,044,863 from the Groundwater Treatment Fund.

RECOMMENDATION FOR AWARD OF CITY OF REEDLEY WELLHEAD TCP TREATMENT FACILITIES FOR WELLS 13 AND 14

Factual Summary

The City of Reedley ("City") issued a notice to bidders for the Wellhead TCP Treatment Facilities for Wells 13 and 14 Project ("Project") on July 10, 2019. The sealed bids were due and the bid opening occurred on August 1, 2019. Six bids were received, and the lowest monetary bid was received from Steve Dovali Construction, Inc. ("SDC").

The City's bid form contains an express requirement for bidder's qualifications, as follows:

Bidder's Qualifications

The Bidder for the Wellhead Treatment and Improvements for Wells 13 and 14 shall have previously constructed wellhead treatment projects using GAC potable water treatment systems within the United States for a minimum of 750 gpm. Systems cited in experience submittals shall have been downflow, pressure-type configurations using similar vessel diameter and design as this project. The Bidder shall have had system responsibility, including site work construction and installation, and vessel and piping assembly on at least three separate project sites.

Immediately following the stated Bidder's Qualifications requirement, the bid form contained blanks for the bidder to include reference information for three GAC wellhead treatment projects previously performed by the bidder. SDC's bid included the following information in this section for previous project reference information:

Following the bid opening, the City's engineering consultant contacted each of the references for the previous projects listed in SDC's bid. Based on the information received from the listed

references, none of the previous projects listed in SDC's bid met the qualifications required for the Project. As a result, the City sent written notice to SDC on August 16, 2019, informing SDC that the based on the information received from the listed references, SDC did not meet the qualifications to perform the Project. As a result, SDC was informed that City staff intended to recommend SDC's bid be rejected. SDC was offered the opportunity to respond and present evidence to counter the information received from the references listed in its bid, and was offered an informal hearing with the Public Works Director ("Director") to address the matter.

Upon receiving the City's August 16, 2019, notice, SDC requested the offered hearing. The City sent written notice to SDC on August 19, 2019, setting the hearing for September 5, 2019, and confirming the purpose of the hearing.

Thereafter, SDC submitted a letter and various materials to the Director on August 19, 2019, and on August 28, 2019. The letter and materials were reviewed by the Director and the City's engineering consultant. The letter and materials included references for eight projects that SDC asserted it had previously performed which included the required GAC potable water treatment systems. In exercising due diligence, the City's engineering consultant contacted the references for the eight additional projects. The comments from the references for the additional projects were mixed about SDC's performance on those projects. Additionally, the City's engineering consultant included a comment about its experience with the electrical subcontractor listed in SDC's bid involving late submittals and delays by the subcontractor.

On September 4, 2019, the Director sent SDC the summary prepared by the City's engineering consultant containing the information received from the references for the three projects listed in SDC's bid, and the summary of information received from the references provided by SDC in the materials submitted on August 19th and August 28th for the 8 other projects identified, and the comment by the engineering consultant about its experience with the electrical subcontractor listed in SDC's bid. SDC responded to the Director via email on September 4th that the summary was misleading, and confirmed SDC would attend the hearing for the next day.

The hearing was held on September 5, 2019, as scheduled. At the hearing, SDC admitted that none of the three reference projects listed in its bid included the required GAC treatment facilities as had been stated in the bid, and confirmed that those three projects were listed in its bid by mistake. Notwithstanding the mistake, SDC requested that the City consider the other reference projects SDC had submitted after the formal bid opening. The electrical subcontractor attended the hearing and addressed the late submittal on the other project referenced by the City's engineering consultant in the summary.

At the conclusion of the hearing, and via an email to the Director following the hearing on September 5th, SDC requested that the City accept its bid as responsive and waive the irregularity with the listed previous projects, and award the project to SDC.

Discussion

Introduction.

SDC's failure to list any previous projects in its bid for which it had performed the required GAC potable water treatment system, was not determined from the face of the bid but only after the City's engineering consultant contact the references. Upon the discovery, the City provided adequate notice and opportunity to SDC to address the issues with its bid and its qualifications to perform the project.

The notices and information provided by the City to SDC after the bid opening, and the hearing the City afforded SDC, all satisfy the requirements required by applicable law. (City of Inglewood-Los Angeles County Civic Center Authority v. Superior Court (1972) 7 Cal.3d 861; D.H. Williams v. Clovis Unified School District (2007) 146 Cal.App.4th 1432; Great West Contractors, Inc. Irvine Unified School District (2010) 187 Cal.App.4th 1425.) SDC was provided sufficient notice and opportunity to rebut the information the City received from the three listed project references in SDC's bid.

The City has discretion to waive irregularities in a bid, as long as the irregularity is inconsequential. Although authorized, a City is not required to waive inconsequential bid defects or irregularities in a bid, and can demand strict compliance with its bid document. (*Taylor Bus Service v. San Diego Board of Education* (1987) 195 Cal.App.3rd 1331).

The determination of what is an inconsequential bid defect or irregularity involves a number of factors. However, if the bid defect or irregularity establishes a ground for a bidder to withdraw its bid without incurring liability under its bid bond, then it is not inconsequential and cannot be waived. (Bay Cities Paving & Grading, Inc. v. San Leandro (2014) 223 Cal.App.4th 1181.)

The City is prohibited from waiving a bid defect if that defect would allow a bidder to withdraw its bid without liability under the bid bond, because to do so would give the bidder a competitive advantage over other bidders. Finally, a bidder is prohibited from changing a bid because of a mistake in its bid. (Public Contract Code 5101.)

B. SDC's Responsibility.

The bid documents require that bidders have performed previous projects with GAC potable water treatment systems. The three projects listed in SDC's bid did not meet the qualifications required for the Project. After being informed by the City, SDC submitted information on eight different projects to attempt to establish its qualifications.

The comments received from the references were mixed about SDC's performance on the additional projects submitted after the bid opening. SDC and its listed electrical subcontractor addressed the comments during the hearing, and it was confirmed that SDC had performed previous projects with GAC water treatment systems. In the end, it appears SDC may be qualified to perform the Project. However, as explained below, the City cannot consider the additional information submitted by SDC after the bid opening.¹

¹ Because SDC's bid must be rejected as nonresponsive, a recommendation of whether SDC is a responsible bidder may not be necessary. However, to the extent necessary, if SDC's bid is found to be responsive, it is recommended that SDC be found to be not responsible on the grounds of a failure to follow clear bid instructions, and based on the comments regarding SDC's performance received from the references for the additional projects SDC provided after the bid opening. A determination of non-responsibility is not made lightly, as it may have an adverse impact on

C. SDC's Bid was Nonresponsive and the City Cannot Waive the Defect in SDC's Bid.

SDC confirmed that the three previous project references listed in its bid were a mistake. This mistake is not a minor irregularity or inconsequential defect that can be waived by the City. Rather, this is the type of mistake that would allow SDC to withdraw its bid pursuant to Public Contract Code sections 5101, et. seq.² and claim it was not qualified to perform and incur no liability under its bid bond. This creates an unfair competitive advantage prohibited in the competitive public contracting arena. Accordingly, the City may not waive SDC's bid defect and its failure to list previous projects with GAC potable water treatment systems.³

Moreover, allowing SDC to replace the previous project reference information listed in its bid with completely different projects submitted more than two weeks after the bid opening would result in a change in the bid because of a mistake, which is expressly prohibited by Public Contract Code § 5101.

Conclusion and Recommendation

For the reasons described above, SDC's bid must be rejected as nonresponsive. It is recommended that the City Council reject SDC's bid as nonresponsive. Following rejection of SDC's bid, the City Council may award the project to the next lowest responsible bidder who submitted a responsive bid.

Clovis Unified School District* (2007) 146 Cal.App.4th 757, a determination of non-responsibility may also need to be made.

² Although SDC asserts it does not want to withdraw its bid because of the mistake, a competitive advantage exists because the bid mistake creates an actual ground for SDC to withdraw its bid, even if SDC was awarded the contract, without incurring liability under its bid bond. (See *Bay Cities Paving & Grading, Inc. v. San Leandro* (2014) 223 Cal.App. 4th 1181.)

³ It must be noted that none of the three previous projects listed in SDC's bid meet the qualification requirement. Had SDC listed one or two previous projects involving GAC systems, the result and recommendation would likely be different.

RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution No. 2019-083 amending the 2019-20 Fiscal Year Budget to appropriate \$16,533 in available Park and Recreational Development Impact Fees for Columbia Park improvements, specifically, to provide a ½ basketball court as a new amenity.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since the removal of the play structure in Columbia Park this space has been unavailable to the public and blocked off for safety. Due to the constant vandalism to the play structure staff does not feel replacing it with the same type of amenity would be best. After consideration of what type of amenity would fit better in this space staff is recommending replacing the play structure with a 1/2 basketball court.

Mattco Construction provided a quote for the work which includes removal of the existing concrete, backfill with 15 yards of soil, level and compact of the soil, form and concrete construction of the new pad, installation of the basketball goal, netting, backboard and painting of the "Key". The existing water fountain does not work, so it will be removed and not replaced. The quote is for \$14,580; however, staff is requesting an additional \$450 for the removal of a tree that encroaches on the project space and \$1,503 representing a standard 10% project contingency for unforeseen items. This brings the total project cost to \$16,533.

BACKGROUND

Columbia Park is located in a residential area at the corners of North Columbia and East Cypress Avenues. This is classified as a Neighborhood Park due to the location and size of the area. It is approximately .72 acres of open informal turf. The original construction included a concrete path leading to the play area as well as a drinking fountain. Over the years there has been constant maintenance concerns due to vandalism to the play structure. The structure was so badly damaged staff felt this was a major safety concern. The decision was made to remove the play structure about one year ago.

FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, this project would be funded by \$16,533 of available Park and Recreational Development Impact Fees to provide a new amenity in Columbia Park.

COMMITTEE/COMMISSION REVIEW/ACTIONS

On August 22, 2019, the Community Services Commission discussed this project. The Commission was excited to see that the City is investing in rehabilitating existing parks and trying to revitalize them so that the public that lives close by can utilize them in new ways. The Commission recommends this project to the City Council for approval.

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council receive, review, and file the Quarterly Investment Report for 4th Quarter Fiscal Year 2018-19, ending June 30, 2019, as required by the City's Investment Policy last adopted on March 12, 2019. No action is required other than to receive, review, and file the report.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Year to date net interest earnings (net of fees) as of 4th quarter 2018-19 total \$761,451 which is 680.47% of annual budgeted interest earnings of \$111,900 across all funds. The prior 4th quarter net interest earnings for the same 12 month period one year ago (4th quarter FY 2017-18) were (\$35,687). The attached investment/pooled cash report shows additional detail for cash balances by City fund. The treasury pool for the City totals \$24,723,179 as of June 30, 2019, including \$1,842,512 in bond trustee funds, \$229,547 on deposit in the California Employers' Retiree Benefit Trust, \$7,218,698 in Groundwater Treatment funds, and \$4,302,208 of remaining 2011 RDA bond proceeds. The cash balances in the funds are at a point in time only, and do not reflect pending receivable or payable amounts. All financial investment instruments are constantly monitored and assessed for safety, liquidity and yield. The City's idle funds are currently in principal safe investments that protect its pooled cash, such as Five-Star Bank and Rabobank money market accounts, rolling Certificates of Deposit through Multi-Bank Securities in various FDIC insured accounts, and the Central San Joaquin Valley Risk Management Authority investment pool, managed by Chandler Asset Management.

All investments in the portfolio are in compliance with the City's current Investment Policy, and staff does not anticipate any issues with regard to the City's ability to meet expenditure requirements for the next six months. (Government Code section 53646)

BACKGROUND

On March 12, 2019 the City Council approved the annual statement of investment policy. The policy includes a self-imposed, 'best practice' reporting requirement to implement a Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommendation that an agency's investment policy explicitly require periodic reporting. The attached Pooled Cash Report for the end of 4th quarter fiscal year 2018-19 shows cash balances/market value and interest earnings for every cash account and investment vehicle as of June 30, 2019. It is important to note that the pooled cash report also includes restricted funds such as unused RDA bond proceeds, deposits in trust, bond reserves, funds held for groundwater treatment, and RDA Successor Agency funds. Full account statements for all accounts are on file with the Administrative Services Department and available for inspection at any time.

Cash balances are pooled for investment and banking purposes, as it is not practical to have separate investment accounts for each City fund. Interest earnings are apportioned to each City fund based upon the percentage that a particular fund balance makes up of the total. For instance, if the City's General Fund balance was 10% of the total cash balances of the City, it would be credited with 10% of the investment interest earnings for the period.
